Topic	The Seasons and Our Country. If you have any resources that you feel would
	be of use, please come and see me.
Maths	Reception:
	* Time: days of week, o'clock times, how long is a minute? At home - in the
	mornings talk about the day, what day will it be tomorrow? Which days
	are we off school? Talk about days you do certain things on, use a timer
	to time how many different things they can do in a minute - have races!
	Point out times during the day using o'clock i.e. we have breakfast at?
	Tea? Bath? etc.
	* Counting: counting objects, counting out a given number of objects from

a group, reciting numbers up to 100, talking about numbers - which are bigger/smaller? Using this to order them. Counting forward and back At home - encourage your child to help you by counting objects around the home i.e. 4 forks for tea, encouraging your child to move objects as they count to ensure correct counting, games involving counting from different numbers, what number comes next? Counting back from a given number. \* Shape and space - looking at 2D and 3D shapes: naming and describing, sorting shapes into different group. At home: encourage your child to notice shapes in and around the home, talk about the shapes of everyday objects, encourage your child to describe them using the language of corners, sides, edges, curved, straight. Ask questions about the shapes they see i.e. how is it different/the same as a ...?

\* Adding: Finding I and 2 more, saying which number is I and 2 more than a given number. At home: asking your child to count you out a given number of objects, then adding I or 2 more? How many now? How can I check? Card games - picking a number card from a pile and saying the number that is I or 2 more.

## Year 1:

- \*Find one more/less than any 2-digit number to 100. At home: practise counting forward and back from different numbers up to 100/play missing number games.
- \*Count in 10s, 2s and 5's from any number, find missing multiples of ten in a sequence. At home: practise counting in 2's, 5's and 10's from any number to 100, using a 100 square.
- \*Know number bonds to 8/9/10 by heart and write as number sentences. At home: look for songs and videos on YouTube to help your child to recall their number bonds.
- \*Know the value of each coin to £1, find totals of 2 and 3 coins to 10p, find ways to pay for items costing up to 10p, add coins and amounts

which total more than 10p, add 10p and 20p to 2-digit prices, find change from 10p by counting on and using number bonds. At home: practise naming the coins and talking about how many pennies are in each. Play shops, allowing your child to pick 2 or 3 items and add the prices to work out the totals and allow them opportunities to work out how much change to give when they have been given too much.

\*Find half of numbers up to 24 (links to odd and even numbers) and understand why it is tricky to halve odd numbers. At home: practise halving objects such as food, Lego, toys; odd number could be shared between them and a friend/sibling - talk about how it is not fair as they cannot be shared equally.

\*Tell the time to the hour and half hour. Describe what would be happening at different times of the day and find the time half an hour later. At home: practise reading the clock at different times in the day, talk about the time and what you do at that time is breakfast, leave the house, eat tea etc. Set a timer to check the clock again in half an hour - what time is it now?

Reception:

How you can help at home:

Listen to your child read every night, for five minutes at a time, practise reading and writing the sounds that are sent home in phonics, practise reading and writing the high frequency (red and green) words that were sent home, practise writing short sentences with words containing the sounds learnt, ensuring a capital letter is used at the start of a sentence and full stop at the end. ## Year 1:

With the year I phonics screening at the start of June, it would be really beneficial for your child to practice reading words with the phase 3/4/5 sounds in. The phonics play website has lots of games to practise this. Please ask your child to tell you what digraphs/trigraphs they can see first (sounds made of 2/3 letters), as this will help their recognition of these. If they are reading words that are on paper, ask them to draw on the sound buttons before reading. Any questions please come and see me after school and I can explain this to you in more detail. Please also focus on practising spellings from the new year I National Curriculum, a copy of which is attached.

	brushes, creating shapes and filling areas, making changes to improve work,
	adding text to a drawing and using a programme to create a poster.
	How you can help at home:
	Use a programme such as Microsoft Paint or a free online painting
	application (please ensure it is suitable for young children first) such

	as http://www.tuxpaint.org/download/ to practise paintaing.
PSHE	Relationships: Feelings and emotions and valuing differences. We will be
	talking about a wide range of feelings, special people in our lives,
	different types of behavior, what fair and unfair means, what kind and
	unkind means, right and wrong, how people's feelings can be hurt,
	listening to others and playing cooperatively, what it means to give
	support and feedback to others, when things don't go well with friends
	and other children, types of teasing and bullying and why they are
	wrong and unacceptable and how to deal with this and differences and
	similarities between people.
	How you can help at home:
	Discuss the above points with your child and jot down what they tell you on a
	wow card, to share with the class.
RE	This term the theme for RE is 'Why is Jesus important?'. The children will be
	thinking about who is important to them and then learning
	about Jesus' life and ministry and how this might affect how Christians
	behave. Each of our school Golden Values is linked with a Bible story. Our
	Golden Rule for being kind to others is linked with the story of the Good
	Samaritan.
	How you can help at home:
	Share the story of the Good Samaritan and discuss this and how it links to our
	values.
